The core idea of the DWT is to decompose a signal into a set of approximation coefficients and detail coefficients at different levels. At each level:

1. The signal is passed through a **low-pass filter**, resulting in approximation coefficients (representing the lower-frequency components).
2. The signal is passed through a **high-pass filter**, resulting in detail coefficients (representing the higher-frequency components).

This process is then recursively applied to the approximation coefficients, creating a multi-resolution analysis. This decomposition is closely related to **multiresolution analysis (MRA)**, a theoretical framework that underpins the DWT.

Key characteristics of DWT:

1. **Efficient computation:** Significantly faster than CWT.
2. **Non-redundant representation:** Provides a compact representation of the signal.
3. **Discrete parameters:** Uses discrete scales and translations, typically powers of 2.
4. **Reconstruction:** The original signal can be perfectly reconstructed from its DWT coefficients.

The choice between CWT and DWT depends on the specific application. CWT is often used for detailed signal analysis and feature extraction, while DWT is preferred for signal compression, denoising, and efficient processing.

Popular Wavelet Families
