This cannot be stressed enough. Never leave your baby unattended while they are eating.

5. Embrace the "Mess is Best" Mentality

The more they explore, the more they learn. Don't let the mess deter you.

6. Observe and Respond

Pay attention to your baby's cues. If they turn their head away, close their mouth, or push food away, they are likely full. Don't force them to eat more.

7. Introduce Foods Gradually

As your baby's skills develop, you can offer more varied textures and larger pieces.
