The network devices themselves become simple forwarding elements, executing the instructions received from the controller.

Key Components of an SDN Architecture

An SDN architecture typically consists of three main layers:

1. Applications Layer

This layer comprises the network applications and services that leverage the SDN controller to program the network. These can include traffic engineering applications, security policies, load balancers, network monitoring tools, and orchestration platforms. These applications communicate their desired network behavior to the controller via **Northbound APIs** (Application Programming Interfaces).

2. Control Layer (SDN Controller)

The SDN controller is the heart of the SDN architecture. It provides a centralized point of control and intelligence for the entire network. It translates the requirements from the applications layer into low-level forwarding instructions for the network devices. These devices are often referred to as "white-box" switches or programmable network elements, as they are designed to be controlled by external software rather than relying solely on their embedded firmware. OpenFlow is a prominent open standard protocol that enables the SDN controller to communicate

with the forwarding plane of network devices. It defines a standard way for the controller to instruct switches on how to handle incoming packets. Essentially, OpenFlow allows the controller to install, modify, and delete flow entries in the forwarding tables of switches, thereby dictating traffic paths and network behavior. While OpenFlow is a cornerstone of SDN, other protocols and mechanisms can also be used for controller-device communication.
