Mention attending webinars, reading Microsoft documentation, following industry blogs and forums, participating in user groups, and experimenting with new features. This demonstrates a commitment to continuous learning.

How do you collaborate with business stakeholders to gather requirements and ensure your solutions meet their needs?

Emphasize active listening, clear communication, regular feedback loops, and a user-centric approach. Discuss how you translate business needs into technical solutions.
